GALLUP Seeks LEED Certification and Expands Its Recycling Efforts Gallup is seeking LEED certification for the 103,000 square foot addition to its Omaha Riverfront Campus located between Miller's Landing Park to the North and the Quest Center to the South. With construction already underway, the addition is expected to open in the fall of 2009, and house the estimated 300 Information Technology, Sales, and other professionals that Gallup anticipates adding to its workforce.

Gallup's Director of Facilities Ed Miller, "The addition will be a 4 story structure with a proposed green roof, which will include sod, native grasses, and shrubs." Gallup's existing structures are built on land formerly occupied by an unsightly rail yard, docks, and a scrap metal recycler. The 50 acre campus now has a variety of native trees, grasses and wildflowers.

LEED certification is one of several initiatives that Gallup has undertaken to become an even more environmentally friendly company. According to Julie Curd, Gallup's Executive Director of Materials Management, "In 2007, Gallup recycled 158 tons of waste paper and cardboard. Earlier this year, we improved and expanded our waste paper collection process. As a result, we are seeing a significant increase in the amount of material we recycle on campus. The majority of documents produced at Gallup are printed on recycled paper. Furthermore, we work closely with clients in promoting the selection of biodegradable or recyclable materials which align with our ecofriendly, green initiatives."

FBG Service Corporation Honored with National Sustainability Nomination

FBG Service Corporation, an employee-owned janitorial and buildingservices company headquartered in Omaha, was honored in the nation's capital recently for its leadership and accomplishments as an environmentally responsible business.

Named for renowned S.C. Johnson Company president, *The Sam Johnson Leadership in Sustainability Award* was created to recognize outstanding achievement in the area of environmentally conscience business practices. Curt Johnson, Chairman of JohnsonDiversey and son of Sam Johnson, presented the award.

Nominations were awarded to just 15 companies across the country that displayed "a total commitment to sustainability and a proven track record of meeting the highest standards of facility care for health, safety, economy and environment." In addition to the prestigious award, JohnsonDiversey also pledged a \$5,000 donation to the World Wildlife Fund on behalf of the winner.

NPPD Plans to Expand its Wind Energy Operations

The Nebraska Public Power District will expand its wind energy operations by adding more than 400 megawatts of wind power over the next 12 years. According to the American Wind Energy Association 225 to 300 homes can be served per megawatt of wind energy.

NPPD currently operates a wind farm south of Ainsworth, which produces 60 megawatts. The company is also involved in two wind farm projects near Bloomfield. Power will be purchased from these wind farms once they are fully operational.

Reducing Radon Risk in Rental Housing

Lincoln's Carbon Footprint

The recent study completed by the Lincoln-Lancaster County Health Department shows that Lincoln is below the U.S. average for CO2 emissions (approximately 20 tons per person per year). However, from 1990 to 2005 the city's amount of emissions grew from 3.1 million tons to almost 4.6 million tons, an increase of 46%.

The largest increase in greenhouse emissions during this time period was due to transportation. The city of Lincoln has grown over this 15 year time frame which in turns puts more drivers on the roads.

ELECTRONICS UPDATE

Only a small number of cell phones being recycled

According to a survey released by Nokia, worldwide, only 3% of people recycle their mobile phones even though they have old phones at home. The survey shows that 74% didn't think about recycling while half of the people didn't even know that they could do so.

While these numbers are startling, only 4% of the old devices are being thrown in the landfill. The remaining phones are either kept at home, given to a friend or family to use, or being sold to other consumers.

The survey was conducted in 13 countries including Finland, Germany, Italy, Russia, Sweden, United Kingdom, United Arab Emirates, U.S., Nigeria, India, China, Indonesia, and Brazil

World survey of green habits rank U.S. consumers last

Americans rank last in a new National Geographic-sponsored survey released Wednesday that compares environmental consumption habits in 14 countries.

Americans were least likely to choose the greener option in three out of four categories - housing, transportation and consumer goods - according to the assessment. In the fourth category, food, Americans ranked ahead of Japanese consumers, who eat more meat and seafood. The rankings, called "Greendex," are the first to compare lifestyles and behaviors of consumers in multiple countries, according to the National Geographic Society. It plans to conduct the 100-plus question survey annually and considers trends more important than yearly scores, said Terry Garcia of National Geographic.

India and Brazil tied for the highest score - 60 points out of a hundred. U.S. consumers scored 44.9. In between, China scored 56.1, Mexico 54.2, Hungary 53.2, Russia 52.4, Great Britain 50.2, Germany 50.2, Australia 50.2, Spain 50, Japan 49.1, France 48.7 and Canada 48.5. Results are based on 1,000 online respondents per country interviewed in January and February by GlobeScan, an international polling firm based in Toronto. The consumer choice rankings were adjusted for factors in which individuals have no control, such as climate and the availability of mass transit.

Sam's Club introduces new milk bottles

Sam's Club has unveiled its newly designed, fully recyclable, 1 gallon milk jugs. The new rectangular shape always for better stacking and is making transportation cheaper. There is more plastic used in these new bottles but because of the design less plastic is used in the packaging. 224 jugs can now be put in coolers that hold only 80 jugs with the conventional design. This amount of fuel that will be saved is estimated to equal the equivalent of taking 11,000 trucks off of the road.

The bottles are currently being sold in 189 Sam's Club. A date has not yet been announced for these bottles to be sold at Wal-Mart.
